Synopsis: This bill amends section 5511 of the Crimes Code, Title 18 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, relating to cruelty to animals, to prohibit the killing of a dog or cat for the purpose of human consumption.

## Summary:

## Definition of offense

Under new section 5511(c.1) a person commits an offense if the person does any of the following:
(1) Kills a dog or cat, regardless of ownership of the animal, for the purpose of human consumption.
(2) Processes dog or cat meat for the purpose of human consumption.
(3) Breeds, keeps, sells, offers for sale or transfers a dog or cat for the purpose of human consumption.
(4) Offers dog or cat meat for human consumption.

## Grading

As a general rule, a person who violates section 5511(c.1) commits a misdemeanor of the first degree and shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than $\$ 1,000$ nor more than $\$ 10,000$ or to imprisonment for not more than five years, or both. A person who has committed a prior offense commits a third degree felony and shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than $\$ 2,500$ nor more than $\$ 15,000$ or to imprisonment for not more than seven years, or both. A prior offense shall mean a conviction, adjudication of delinquency, acceptance of ARD or other form of preliminary disposition, occurring before the sentence on the present violation.

## Effective date

This act takes effect in 60 days.
Background: The House of Representatives passed House Bill 1750 on November 18, 2013 by a vote of 201 to 0 .
